West College Scotland and AC Whyte & Co have together established an award-winning Skills Academy in a direct response to a skills gap identified by the company.

The Academy has opened up a flow of highly trained staff for the Barrhead-based construction company, which delivers major refurbishment projects, mainly to local authorities and housing associations.

Early in 2018 the company approached the College to explain it had an immediate skills shortage in relation to wall insulation skills.

The College quickly recognised the opportunities for students, lecturers and the company itself. Our Construction team met senior company management and made a series of on-site visits to better understand overall training needs.





We will nurture these students, educating them with relevant content and skills, instilling our company values and building them into future stars of AC Whyte.

By August 2018, we had gained accreditation for specific Scottish Qualifications Authority units, providing AC Whyte's team with a Level 2 qualification in External Wall Boarding and External Render application. Together, we developed the remaining course content, which included an understanding of AC Whyte's culture, ethos and values.

The AC Whyte Skills Academy is located in a newly refurbished workshop on our Finnart St campus in Greenock, complete with AC Whyte signage and livery. The first cohort of apprentices ranged in age from 19 to mid-40s.

In September 2018, the Skills Academy was formally launched by Derek Mackay MSP, Cabinet Secretary for Finance, Economy and Fair Work.

More than half the students who started have now secured full-time employment with AC Whyte and in June 2019 we were delighted to win the prestigious Herald HE Award for Outstanding Business Engagement.

The AC Whyte Skills Academy is an excellent example of how a college can work with industry to identify and close skills gaps, while at the same time allowing students to train in class and gain skills in a real workplace environment.

SCVLPTVR is one of Glasgow's most prestigious hairdressing enterprises. In August 2018, we set up the **WCS with SCVLPTVR Training Academy** to take teaching out of the classroom and into the salon. Learning at the Academy sees students presented with challenges designed to develop not only their vocational skills but also those other skills that all modern employers are looking for. Students help set prices, use their own social network platforms to market themselves and the salon and are given responsibility for their own time management and the development of important industry contacts. All students finished the course and all have been offered permanent jobs!



FLEXIBLE WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT FUND (FWDF)

West College Scotland is one of the country's largest providers of training through the Flexible Workforce Development Fund. In 2018-19, we helped upskill and retrain staff from more than fifty employers from across the private, public and third sectors. We have nurtured new client relationships and developed new products to meet market demand. Our training ranges from Leadership and IT skills to Health and Safety and Resilience-building.



RECOGNISING GREAT EMPLOYER ENGAGEMENT

In September 2019, the College instituted the **West College Scotland Fellowship** awards. Among the first recipients were Colin Taylor, Managing Director of Neat Living, which designs a range of energy-efficient homes, and David Ross, Director of Glasgow architects Keppie Design. Colin and David have set client-focused projects to give students real-life work experience of design – working to deadlines, presenting to clients and building industry contacts. Hundreds of Design students have benefited from our partnerships with both.



We hold a unique position among the communities of the West region. West College Scotland is the thread linking people with education, schools with employers and the future with the past. We seek to widen access to education for people from all backgrounds. We work with many organisations, including our local authority partners, to deliver economic development priorities. And we engage with some of our most vulnerable citizens to improve wellbeing and enhance opportunities.

CLEARING PATHWAYS, OPENING DOORS

Chloe Allan, Ashleigh McBay and Samantha McLean are among the youngest students ever to graduate from West College Scotland.

The excellent partnership forged between our school and West College Scotland has enabled our young people to access a more relevant and flexible curriculum with a clear focus on developing skills for learning, life and work.

Linda Booth, Headteacher, St Peter the Apostle, Clydebank The trio – all in sixth year – attended school and came to College four afternoons a week to study HNC Business. They did so as part of the Vocational Schools Programme. In September 2019, they were awarded their certificates by the Principal at a formal graduation ceremony in Clydebank Town Hall.

Chloe, from St Peter the Apostle school in Clydebank, is now studying for a Masters in International Business at Strathclyde University, while Ashleigh and Samantha, both from Clydebank High, have begun Business courses at Glasgow Caledonian University.

The girls were just three of hundreds of secondary school pupils who came through our doors in 2018-19 as part of our Vocational Schools Programme. This is an important and growing part of our work in the community. It is designed to allow senior-phase pupils to taste and explore subjects they may not have had the chance to study at school. As Chloe, Ashleigh and Samantha found, the Programme can be a wonderful way for young people to gain relevant skills, and progress straight to work, to an apprenticeship, to college or university.

OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO THE LOCAL COMMUNITY WORKING WITH VETERANS

Our commitment to some of our most vulnerable citizens was recognised in June 2019 when the College was shortlisted in the Outstanding Contribution to the Local Community category at the Herald HE Awards. As signatories of the Armed Forces Covenant, the College is committed to helping veterans develop skills and improve wellbeing. Since November 2018, our Complementary Therapy students have been working with veterans and staff from the Scottish War Blind Association in Paisley and The Erskine Reid MacEwen Activity Centre in Bishopton to deliver treatments such as massage, aromatherapy and



mindfulness. So far, about 40 ex-servicemen and women - many of whom suffer from service- and stress-related conditions have benefited.

We have been able to offer a number of different therapies which is great. The students offer the veterans an impressively wide choice.

CELEBRATING OUR COMMUNITIES

The College marked the 200th anniversary of the death of **Greenock**-born James Watt, by awarding a James Watt Prize to the Inverclyde student who had most excelled in STEM subjects – Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. It was awarded to James Bradley, an inspirational young man who overcame serious health issues to resume his education at WCS in 2016. James now studies Applied Science at HNC level and is a STEM ambassador, working with Inverclyde school-children to engage them in science.

We further strengthened our partnership with the HMS Hood Association when we hosted a moving ceremony to mark the 100th anniversary of the



launch from John Brown's **Clydebank** shipyard of one of the Royal Navy's greatest vessels. The College also accepted on long-term loan a model of HMS Hood from the Association. It is now on permanent display in our Clydebank campus.

And we were delighted when John Byrne agreed to become a Fellow of West College Scotland. John Byrne, who was born in **Paisley**, is an artist and playwright of the first rank who has made a huge contribution to the culture of Scotland. He also supports the John Byrne Award for school-children across Renfrewshire and accepted his Fellowship at a ceremony in the historic Paisley Abbey.
