CAR MECHANICS

Course Outline

An opportunity to gain experience in the Motor Vehicle repair industry.

SQA Units will cover: The Garage and The Car. You will gain experience working on real cars and rigs in a realistic environment.

Continual assessment will run through the course on the skills that are being developed. This will allow students to gain useful knowledge for both themselves in later life and the potential of employment in vehicle repair industry.

Entry Level Recommended

- You must be working towards at least 3 national 4 awards
- Preferably, English, Maths and a Science subject

Course Content

Understanding how the garage is set up and works. Alongside this there is an introduction which looks at the car, how the systems operate and common repair areas.

Progression

This course will allow a taste of what to expect in the vehicle repair industry. It will give knowledge which could assist in getting a Modern Apprentice position within a garage or alternatively a full-time position on a further education course.

INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTER GAMES INDUSTRY

The hospitality industry recruits a vast number of skilled and unskilled workers each year and the workforce continue to be heavily reliant upon young people aged 16-19 years. From a café, coffee shop, licenced restaurant or hotel this combination of industry required certificates and skills added to your CV will help you find employment.

On this course you will develop knowledge an understanding of personal hygiene, food safety and health and safety requirements when working in a professional kitchen along with organisational and time management skills required to follow recipes and produce dishes. You will also learn how to professionally use and care for knifes within professional kitchens.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I get there?

Your school will organise transport to take you to the college, and take you back to the nearest point to your home at the end of the day.

How are the vocational course options different from the subjects that I take at school?

The main difference is that with vocational course options there is a strong focus on building skills for life and skills for work. The vocational courses lead to awards such as Scottish Vocational Qualifications (SVQs), City and Guilds (C&G) and Higher National Certificates HNC.

How will the courses be certified?

When you receive your certificate from the Scottish Qualifications Authority (SQA) and City and Guilds, the results of your vocational courses will appear alongside the awards for courses you have completed in school.

So what are the benefits?

The award itself will act as a springboard for you to gain direct entry into the workplace, or into a traineeship or apprenticeship, or to go on to college or university. You will develop valuable skills such as working with others and problem solving, skills that you will need if you are to succeed in the world of work.
