Learn the skills you need for the future, while you're still at school What is a Foundation Apprenticeship?

A Foundation Apprenticeship is an SCQF Level 6 qualification. You can sit a Foundation Apprenticeship over two years, starting in 5th year or a shorter duration course starting in 5th or 6th year alongside your Highers and National 5s.

The difference is, you spend time away from school, at college and with an employer. So you get real, practical work experience.

- Get a qualification that employers recognise and the skills you need to start a career in that industry
- Open up your options after school
- You get to work on real projects with an employer. Some of Scotland's biggest, best known organisations are involved, including Barclays, Network Rail and the NHS
- It's a chance to try a career out so you can decide if it's right for you

ACCOUNTANCY FOUNDATION APPRENTICESHIP

Course Outline

The Foundation Apprenticeship in Accountancy is ideally for pupils in S6 and takes 1 years to complete. The aim of the Foundation Apprenticeship Accounting course is to help you understand and use financial information. You will learn how to record and analyse financial accounting and bookkeeping. The Foundation Apprenticeship in Accountancy includes the professional qualification of Association of Accounting Technicians, a Level 2 Certificate in Bookkeeping. This qualification allows for easy transition onto the MA or the GA in Accountancy. Previous successful learners have gone to employment with organisations such as KPMG and Morgan Stanley, or continued to study progressing onto HNC Accounting or Finance Degree programmes.

These qualifications have been designed in collaboration with employers and are proven to boost earning potential. The CMI qualifications enable management delegates to progress following a series of leadership education pathways.

This is an intensive course and requires you to be self-motivated, enthusiastic and prepared to study out with college. You will be working in labs that are equipped with the latest games software and hardware that will foster an atmosphere conducive to creative games development.

Entry Level Recommended

You must have:

- 3 passes at National 4, 1 of which should be Maths
- Due to the competitive nature of this sector, it helps if you demonstrate a real passion for gaming and you will be asked to provide a short personal statement on why you want to attend college

HIGHER CHILDCARE AND DEVELOPMENT

Course Outline

The course would be suitable if you are considering a career in Primary Teaching or Childhood Practice.

It enables you to understand child development from pre-birth to 16 and the roles and responsibilities of those who contribute to the development of children and young people.

You will gain skills, knowledge and understanding that help you to contribute to the development of children in personal and professional contexts.

The main aims of the course are to:

- understand child development and the factors that influence it from pre-birth to 16
- understand theories of development and the way these are applied to working with children and young people
- develop awareness of initiatives and/or strategies used to inform current childhood practice

- develop awareness of current services for children and young people
- understand the role and responsibilities of professionals and others in contributing to the development of children and young people
- develop skills of investigating, analysing, evaluating and presenting information

SOCIAL SERVICES CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE FOUNDATION APPRENTICESHIP

Course Outline

The Foundation Apprenticeship in Social Services Children and Young People is for pupils in S5 & S6. Pupils can study this framework over a 1 or 2 year period (S6 1 year only).

Pupils will complete a National Progression Award (NPA) at SCOF level 6. This includes knowledge units that support pupils to develop an understanding of how children develop and learn, play and child protection. Pupils will also complete the 4 mandatory Units of the SVO 2 Social Services Children and Young People. The NPA will provide knowledge and an introduction to the skills that will help complete the SVQ units. The NPA has 24 SCOF credit points at SCOF level 6 and the 37 credit points at SCQF level 6. These two parts, along with associated work placement, form the Foundation Apprenticeship in Social Services Children and Young People.

HIGHER PSYCHOLOGY

Course Outline

The course provides you with the opportunity to enhance your knowledge and understanding of human psychology.

This is achieved by studying a variety of topics that will help you understand the human mind and behaviour from a scientific perspective. There are currently two units on the Higher Psychology course; Social Behaviour and Individual Differences.

In the Social Behaviour unit, you will study the mandatory topics of conformity, compliance, and obedience before moving on to study the optional topics of prejudice and aggression. For the Individual Differences unit, you will study the mandatory topics of sleep and dreams before moving on to study the optional topics of depression and memory. The course also consists of a Research Investigation which involves selecting a suitable topic for research before designing and conducting that research in collaboration with other class members. Research Investigations are individually written before being submitted for external marking. There is a final exam.

In addition to these units, students will complete a Research Investigation and keep a logbook to record progress. The Research Investigation is worth 40 marks and contributes 33% towards the final grade.

The remaining 66% of the final grade comes from the end of course external exam, which assesses your knowledge and understanding of the course content

NPA CRIMINOLOGY

Course Outline

Criminology is the scientific study of crime, including its causes, responses by the criminal justice system, and methods of prevention. It is one of the fastest growing academic subjects in Scotland and the UK.

This National Progression Award (NPA) is designed to introduce you - at SCQF Level 5 - to a selection of topics and areas of debates that inform contemporary ideas of crime and justice.

Pupils should have Nat 5 English and have a keen interest in the subject

In studying these systems, you will also discover what happens when things go wrong, covering conditions as diverse as hyperthyroidism, gigantism and coronary heart disease.

CONSTRUCTION SKILLS FOUNDATION APPRENTICESHIP



Course Outline

The Foundation Apprenticeship in Construction Skills supports the commitment to provide relevant work-based vocational education and training as part of the senior phase curriculum. This will be delivered in partnership with Morrison Construction. This will prepare you for direct entry into a career in the Construction sector and other related occupations, by equipping you with the necessary skills and knowledge to work effectively.

The overall purpose of the course is to ensure that you develop practical and technical skills, alongside the opportunity to develop your meta skills, supported through the delivery of project-based learning supported by industry, while still attending school.

BEGIN MAKE-UP ARTISTRY

Course Outline

National Progression Award in Cosmetology consists of 4 credits. You will work on units such as make-up artistry, practical skills, product awareness, career options and choices, health and safety, prepare and assist in the workplace environment as well as working with customers and colleagues.
